# Yokefellow Welcomes New Administrative Staff

On October 11, Yokefellow welcomed two new faces to serve as administrative staff.

Vita Alligood is Yokefellow's new Executive Director, taking the reins from Sarah Carver, who faithfully served Yokefellow for over four years. Vita has a law degree from Duke University and is currently enrolled at Liberty University Online, earning her Master of Arts in Christian Ministry with a focus on Discipleship and Church Ministry. Vita came to Yokefellow after a career in Corporate America, where she worked as a technical writer, instructional designer, and online college instructor. She has a long history of volunteerism with nonprofits, including Helpline of Durham, North Carolina's Guardian ad Litem program, and Erwin Montessori Elementary School, where she was awarded Guilford County School's Volunteer of the Month, Vita served on the Board of Directors for two nonprofits providing online support for adult survivors of child abuse: Isurvive and Lori's Song. # VOLUNTEERS PURCHASE VAN FOR YOKEFELLOW MEETINGS

Aleta Welch is a volunteer at Southern Correctional. Her husband, William, is a professional truck driver. They have an amazing story to share!

Aleta volunteered for Yokefellow many years ago after an older couple invited her to this ministry. Aleta was touched, so she dedicated herself to the weekly meetings and reaching out to the inmates. Later, she had to stop for a brief period due to illness within her immediate family. After returning to attend the Yokefellow meetings, a stranger (unrelated to Yokefellow) approached her at a spiritual gathering and told her that she and her husband would be going into ministry together.

Aleta talked with her husband about driving a van to transport all the Yokefellow volunteers from their church to Southern Correctional. For a brief period, William drove the Sunset Avenue Church of God's van to transport the volunteers. Because of liability concerns, that avenue closed.

After receiving a word from the Lord, William decided to purchase his own van to transport all Yokefellow volunteers each week to the meetings. Sunset Avenue Church of God provides the funds for the gas. The Welches are excited and confident to be serving in their specific capacities in ministry in an effort to reach people for Christ.

What brought you to Yokefellow?

As a student at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, I was introduced and became acquainted with Yokefellow Prison Ministry in 1984, while serving at Eastern Correctional Institution as an Associate Chaplain in the Supervised Ministry Program. Years later, while serving as the Supervisory Chaplain at the Federal Prison in Butner, Yokefellow was active and visiting the institution on Friday evenings to minister to the CAMP inmates. For many years. I have heard and seen the effect and influence Yokefellow has had on many lives impacted by incarceration. The Yokefellow goal, objective, and method of ministry has always attracted me to this fellowship.

#### What exactly is a State Developer?

Obviously, this position focuses on the ministries of Yokefellow in all the established regions of North Carolina. Briefly, the State Developer will coordinate the work of institutional coordinators regarding recruitment and training of our volunteers. He will develop working relationships with churches, judicatory leadership, and prison officials. He will provide and/or coordinate training for our new volunteers as well as advanced training for seasoned volunteers. The State Developer will serve as a liaison for prison administration and the Executive Director of Yokefellow Prison Ministry of NC. He will develop and enhance existing weekly ministries at institutions while also developing new opportunities where Yokefellow meetings are not currently held. While providing a snap shot of the description of duties, the State Developer looks to provide guidance, encouragement, and care while building relationships within the fellowship, yoked together for one purpose and one purpose only.


